This Fall, we are full speed ahead on developing our plans for the fundraising, restoration, and operation of Miami of Miami Marine Stadium.

Moving Forward

It's been a busy and productive summer:

-Our Economic Impact Study by the Washington Economics Group is almost complete. In several weeks, the study will be posted on our website. This study was financed by a grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation.

-Our Capital Campaign Study, by our consultant, John Capurso, is now underway. The study will determine our community's attitude towards our fundraising effort for the Stadium, specify key problems and opportunities, and identify major leaders and potential gifts for the campaign. The plan is to complete this study in several months. We are now in the "quiet phase" of our capital campaign.

-We're continuing with our general feasibility analysis of major issues such as operations of the Stadium, construction costs and site planning. This is a large, complex project and we want to anticipate as many needs and problems as possible.

-Late in August, we made a presentation to the Marine Stadium Steering Committee. This Committee was appointed by the Miami City Manager to help provide guidance to him on the project. The Committee provided us with useful feedback and an impressive list of what must be accomplished in next several months.

We are very saddened to tell you that Jack Meyer, the esteemed Engineer of the Marine Stadium, passed away last month.

It's hard to overstate Jack's role in designing the Marine Stadium. While at Dignum Engineers, he accepted the assignment of working on the Marine Stadium-after all of the engineers in his office refused to do it. The scope and scale of engineering work that went into this highly complex structure is hard to fathom. Jack said that it was the hardest engineering assignment he ever did in his life. Jokingly, he said that after the Stadium was finished he went to see the movie "The Longest Day" about the D-Day Invasion. All he could think of were the headaches and nightmares he had while working on the structure. Several years ago, he was interviewed by [Dwell Magazine](#) about his work on the Stadium.

Jack did a brilliant job. He said that he designed the Stadium to last 100 years-and that "the roof is not going to fall down. The only way it will come down is if they blow it up." Mike Brainerd, engineer with Simpson, Gumpertz and Heger, who undertook

As you follow the trajectory of this incredibly challenging project and the many hundreds of volunteer hours we have spent on it,

two engineering studies, marveled at the work Jack accomplished without the benefit of a computer. Looking at the Stadium one day, he noted that ALL of the calculations and decisions made to engineer this complex project were "on the money."

Jack was a modest man, soft spoken-but very proud of what he accomplished. In the shadows for a long time, we were able to recognize him and his wonderful wife, Nina, at a memorable dinner at the Biscayne Bay Yacht Club this past Spring. He was honored by Mayor Regalado, the Presidents of three Engineering Societies, representatives of the University of Florida School of Engineering (his alma mater) and others. The setting was most appropriate: Jack was a Commodore of Biscayne Bay Yacht Club (BBYC), widely regarded as perhaps the oldest organization in Miami. BBYC was founded by Miami pioneer Ralph Middleton Munroe-and we are saving the Ralph Middleton Munroe Marine Stadium.

Jack is pictured here with Nathan Brown, a student of Civil Engineering from Princeton University who did his [thesis](#) on the Marine Stadium. Nathan's comprehensive thesis has won multiple awards and Princeton has now conducted several studies on the Stadium. Jack's work is now recognized as an engineering masterpiece.

Now playing an even more vital role, NTHP has stepped up their support: They have provided a \$50,000 planning grant through the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, for technical assistance in our planning for the Stadium. In April, NTHP named the Miami Marine Stadium to their "National Treasures" list. "National Treasures are irreplaceable buildings, landscapes and communities that face urgent threats. NTHP is already working to protect more than thirty "National Treasures" whose potential lose is unimaginable.

More recently, we had the opportunity to meet with staff from NTHP, who came to Miami to get their "first look" at the Marine Stadium. NTHP now plans to give the Marine Stadium their highest priority, and will be providing a high level of technical and marketing assistance, including the creation of a a national marketing campaign.

The extraordinary partnership with NTHP has been an invaluable asset in our effort to restore the Stadium.

Press

Conclusion

Twenty years ago, on August 24, 1992, Hurricane Andrew hit South Florida. The Marine Stadium was shuttered after the Hurricane by the City of Miami. Officials alleged that the Stadium was damaged by the Hurricane-and a grant of \$1 million was obtained from FEMA to demolish it. The insurance company for the City, which would have also been responsible for the demolition, commissioned an engineering study to evaluate the condition of the structure. Click [here](#) to see the last page of the study conducted by Simpson, Gumpertz & Heger which demonstrated that the Stadium was NOT damaged by the Hurricane. In spite of this conclusive proof to the contrary, the perception that the Stadium was damaged by the Hurricane persists. Over the last twenty years, the Stadium has had many "near death experiences" like this one.

We now have our opportunity and challenge to bring it back.
